Whilst we are preparing ourselves, as best we can, for a period of ongoing challenge and change, we are continuing to see the unprecedented business environment we have all faced over the past two years, impacting on our year end results again in 2022. The challenging environment the Pandemic created limited the Trust's ability to generate revenue through its retail arm. This had a significant negative impact on our FY2022 result.

We are very aware, however, that with a crisis in our NZ healthcare system, now is not the time to reduce our service delivery and we'd like to acknowledge the support that is available to us from the Waikato Community Hospice Foundation who provide financial surety whilst we navigate these challenges.

We will take with us the learnings from Covid-19, with a renewed focus on collaboration.

We will engage with our community to reduce chronic care inequities, and to extend our community reach across all aspects of our service delivery.

We look forward to working with you in this space.









Patient ethnicity



The following summarised figures have been extracted from the financial statements of the Waikato Community Hospice Trust.




