Indie's Story

Many parents would say they would do anything to express their love for their children - fortunately, most don't have to.

But love was tested for Eryn and Erin Booth. It meant hardly any sleep and holding a screaming baby for hours in hospital throughout the night - "the noise was so loud, she could be heard at the end of the ward. With the door closed!"

Love meant getting on their knees before an unknown God they weren't sure existed, desperately praying for their precious child to live. It meant leaving friends, work and home to live in an unfamiliar city in order to access support from their families and give more time to their suffering child.

Indie Booth was born just over a year ago (February 2021). She was diagnosed with tuberous sclerosis, a rare genetic condition that causes noncancerous tumors to grow in the brain. Despite the occasional seizure, the condition was under control. Developmentally, "she was actually exceeding, like beating her sister's (progress).... probably about two weeks away from walking" explains her proud

"And then she caught a virus from kindy. Overnight her temperature spiked. She had a massive seizure while we were all sleeping. When I went in there about 7.30 in the morning, I thought she was dead!"

Adding to that Friday's nightmare, the Booth's emergency drive to hospital was frustrated by Wellington's snail paced, rush hour traffic. Indie was still having seizures when the doctors rushed her into incubation and then to the Intensive Care Unit. Because of Covid restrictions, Erin, (20 weeks pregnant at the time) was isolated from her partner, forced to cope alone with the horrific ordeal with her baby in ICU.

By the end of the weekend, Erin found herself and Indie flying from Wellington's ICU to Auckland's Starship hospital. Erin's parents had joined her, while her worriedsick partner, Eryn, looked after their second child at home. But Indie was still unconscious

After an MRI scan, Erin and her mother were given the traumatic news that Indie was not going to make it. "Because she had so much swelling on her brain, it was going to kill her" Erin and her mother contacted their family, requesting them to "hurry up, get on the plane, and come and say goodbye". Over the next three days of not sleeping, the family planned Indie's funeral. On the Wednesday morning, it was expected that Indie would be moved to an isolated room (because of Covid

"We were told, 'we don't really know what's happened, but yesterday Indie was gone. She wasn't breathing on her own. And today, by some miracle, she's back and she's not going to diel'

The only explanation was that Indie was a fighter, she just proved them all wrong!"

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She was removed from the breathing machine and two weeks later, the family flew back to Wellington hospital where she stayed for three months.

As Erin was pregnant and looking after their other child, Indie's Dad stayed in hospital with her most of the time. Because of the brain injury sustained from the seizures, Indie became irritable, "She'd just screamed the whole time" Eryn explained. "I had to cuddle her 24/7. Like three in the morning, I'd pick her up and walk her up and down the ward just to stop her from screaming. It was awful!"

Indie also suffers from dystonia, a movement disorder that causes the muscles to contract involuntarily.

The Booth family have been in Hamilton since May. Eryn, Indie's Dad, is Indie's fulltime carer, in a house full of her support equipment. He is responsible for organizing the many specialist appointments, the 18 forms of anti-seizure medicine she has each day, and he patiently works to tube feed her each meal. "It's just flipped my world upside down. My whole life is dedicated to her, the care just doesn't stop."

Adjusting to a new city has been a challenge. They appreciate the support of



their family, True Colours and the respite care of Rainbow Place who also provide a fortnightly morning tea where Eryn can connect with other parents in a similar position. "You meet these people and think, 'wow, we're not the only ones out there!"

Although it's been tough, Eryn explains Indie has "always been my inspiration, knowing a kid can have a seizure for nine hours and survive!"

If you were to ask, when other parents would have walked away, what is it that motivates them to keep caring for Indie? What keeps them going through all this trauma and suffering? Eryn's simple, yet heartfelt answer is - "I just love her so much".

G.J. Gardner getting behind Rainbow Place

For franchise owner Jeff de Leeuw and his Waikato team, supporting Rainbow Place is a no-brainer.

"We've been involved with Hospice Waikato and Rainbow Place for a number of years, and members of our team had the opportunity to help deliver the annual Rainbow Place Christmas Party before Covid hit. Seeing the challenges faced by the families who are supported by Rainbow Place was a real eye-opener and we decided we wanted to increase

our level of support". It was then that the concept of a Rainbow Place build was born, and after Covid-19 delayed the start of this project, G.J. Gardner Homes Hamilton/Waikato are teaming up with

their sub-contractors to build a threebedroom home in the new Peacocks Road subdivision in early 2023.

The proceeds from the sale of the house will be donated to Rainbow Place and Hospice Waikato CEO, Craig Tamblyn, is absolutely delighted. "We have expanded our Rainbow Place service to include the delivery of in-home respite

care which has been an absolute life changer for some of our families.

This support from G.J. Gardner will enable our care to continue to be provided throughout 2023 and beyond. I know I speak on behalf of our Rainbow Place staff and our families when I say that these funds will make a significant difference. We simply can't thank Jeff and his team enough. We're looking forward to sharing the progress with this build and eventually congratulating the person or family whose house purchase will support such an amazing cause."
